Dearly Beloved-

On November 30<sup>th</sup>, a new Church Year begins. And, on November 30<sup>th</sup>, we enter into the Season of Advent.

For many – me included – Advent is a frantic, frenzied, and sometimes forgotten season. Sure, there are Advent suppers and Midweek Services. Sure, there is the decorating of churches and houses.

However, for many – myself included – Advent gets the short end of the stick. After all, there are SO MANY ACTIVITES! Programs and Pageants; Office Parties and White Elephant Gifts; Who is Hosting Who, and Who is Bringing What; "Did I get all the Presents Wrapped?"; "Will the Weather be Good?"

On and on it goes.

So, it might surprise some of you that Advent was originally (and in some sense, still is) a Penitential Season! Perhaps some of you might recall a church where for Advent, the Color was Purple, and not Blue. Or, maybe you've always wondered, "Why don't we sing the *Gloria in excelsis* during Advent? I thought that was a Lenten thing!"

Well... you're right. It is a **PENITENTIAL** thing. Advent, like Lent, serves as preparation. It is the Fast before the Feast. It prepares not only for the celebration of the **FIRST ADVENT**, when Jesus was Born, but for His **SECOND ADVENT**, when He shall come again: not as a Baby, meek and mild, but as the Mighty King and Righteous Judge.


"Where are you going with this", you might find yourself asking. "Are you telling me I should not eat all those delicious holiday cookies and treats, that are only made this time of year?!"

Well, no... and yes. You are certainly free to rein in your indulgences and cut back on the sweets.

But what I am really getting at is this: **SLOW DOWN!** 

The World is in a mad rush to get to Christmas- to see what sells, to see what's under the tree, and – frankly – to be done with the "holidays". After all, we've been going since... October? Or is it August, when they put away the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, and bring out Halloween?

O come, Thou Wisdom, from on high, and order all things far and nigh; To us the path of knowledge show, and teach us in her ways to go.



## Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel, Shall come to thee, O Israel!

The point is that, for the World (and the Economy), it's a race to the "finish line". For them, Christmas starts right after Thanksgiving.

However, in the Church, we have a different way of doing things. A quieter way. A **SLOWER WAY.** 

Eat your cookies or have no sweets. You're free in the Gospel.

Rather, don't give into the pressure to rush to Christmas. Instead, in repentance and faith, prepare your heart for Christ Jesus.

Here's an easy way to do so: Beginning on Dec. 1<sup>st</sup>, read one chapter of St. Luke's Gospel every day. By the time you hit Christmas, you'll have read the entire Gospel!

You know what is another good way? Come to Church! Not as another "Box to Check Off"; but, instead, as an act of discipline, of intentionally slowing down, and sanctifying your Season with God's Word. (See below for more information.)

Remember, Dearly Beloved: The Twelve Days of Christmas are for, well, **AFTER CHRIST-MAS!** Let your Advent be blessed with Peace and Quietness that, with Gentleness, you may Gradually prepare yourselves for the Holy Nativity of Our Lord and Savior.

1 Arise, O Christian people!

Prepare yourselves today;

Prepare to greet the Savior,

Who takes your sins away.

To us by grace alone

The truth and light were given;

The promised Lord from heaven

To all the world is shown.

2 Prepare the way before Him;

### LCMS Stewardship Ministry

"We ask you, brothers, to respect those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and to esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves" (1 Thess. 5:12-13).



Have you finished your Christmas shopping yet? Do you have a person or two on your list that you just don't know what to give them? While I know you are running short of ideas...dad doesn't really want another tie, and your kid's teacher doesn't need another coffee mug. It can be nothing short of maddening to try to figure things out in the middle of this busy season!

As stewards of all of life and life's resources, we know that life is more than giving gifts. We stewards never want to take anything the Lord provides for granted. During this season of Advent and Christmas, it is a great idea to do whatever you can to be a faithful steward of your pastor. Even more so than the rest of the year, the demands on their time, their presence and their stewardship of the Gospel in the congregation become heightened.

The demands on pastors can wear them down and wear them out. How does the steward in the congregation serve as a faithful steward of the treasure that is their pastor? Here are a few ideas:

- Put them at the top of your prayer list. Pray that the Lord guards them against the weariness that makes them susceptible to the work of the devil.
- Make worship a priority St. Paul admonishes the Thessalonians and us to respect those who labor among us. There is no greater way to steward your pastor than to respect him enough to show up and receive what he has been sent to offer in the proclamation of the Gospel and administration of the Holy Sacraments.
- Be receptive to his work If your pastor is tasked with calling you to repentance or encouraging you to be in worship, know that he is only caring for your soul.
- Esteem him highly Take the time to thank him for his faithful service to Christ, the congregation and your family.
- Be at peace This is an easy time for even minor annoyances to get blown out of proportion and become full-blown conflict. This not only spoils the season of Advent and Christmas, but it also spoils our stewardship of the Gospel and those who serve us in that Gospel. Remember that Jesus came into the world to be the Prince of Peace. This is an act of grace and mercy. The steward seeks to reflect this toward their pastor and their brothers and sisters in Christ.

Stewardship at Christmas can be a challenge. Stewardship of your pastor during this time of the year is critical to our shared stewardship of the Gospel at a time of year when many are more open to hear and receive it.
